MINNEAPOLIS — Following nearly a year of protest, introspection and raw emotion, former Minneapolis officer Derek Chauvin, who last May held a knee down on George Floyd's neck for more than 9 minutes, has been found guilty of second-degree murder and two other charges in Floyd's death.

Chauvin has been remanded to the custody of Hennepin County. He was led out of the courtroom in handcuffs.

Over about three weeks of testimony in court, Minnesota prosecutors have repeatedly told jurors to "believe your eyes" and rely on that video.

"This case is exactly what you thought when you saw it first, when you saw that video. It is exactly that. You can believe your eyes," prosecuting attorney Steve Schleicher said in closing arguments. "This wasn't policing. This was murder."

The guilty verdicts led to cries of joy among those gathered in Minneapolis at the spot where Floyd took his final breath. Floyd family attorney Ben Crump and the Floyd family released a statement praising the verdicts.

"Painfully earned justice

has arrived for George Floyd's family and the community here in Minneapolis, but today's verdict goes far beyond this city and has significant implications for the country and even the world," Crump said in a statement. "Justice for Black America is justice for all of America. This case is a turning point in American history for accountability of law enforcement and sends a clear message we hope is heard clearly in every city and every state."

vaccine immediately, after federal officials announced they are investigating possible links between the one-shot vaccine and severe blood clots.

"Louisiana takes vaccine safety very seriously, and this pause should give the public and providers confidence the system of monitoring and safety checks are working as intended," the health department said in its advisory to hospitals, clinics and pharmacies distributing vaccine doses.

"If you are a provider with J&J doses, while you should pause administration, please continue to store them in your refrigerator," the advisory said.

Ochsner Health quickly shifted a Tuesday vaccination event in New Orleans that planned to use Johnson & Johnson shots to instead use the Pfizer vaccine. Louisiana's largest health system said it was contacting all patients with scheduled appointments for the one-dose J&J vaccine to notify them that they'll receive one of the available two-dose vaccines.

"We have adequate supply of Pfizer and Moderna vaccines and will not need to cancel or reschedule upcoming appointments or vaccine events," Ochsner Health said in its statement.

The Franciscan Missionaries of Our Lady Health System - which operates Our Lady of the Lake Regional Medical Center in Baton Rouge, among its nine hospitals — also announced it was shifting entirely to the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines for its immunization events.


Several community vaccination events that planned to use Johnson & Johnson vaccines were being rescheduled or switching to other vaccines.

8 semifinalists for Louisiana State University's top job

BATON ROUGE, La. — Eight candidates seeking to be Louisiana State University's next president were chosen Wednesday by a search committee for interviews, including the leader of another college system in the state and Gov. John Bel Edwards' top budget adviser.

LSU is seeking a new president in the middle of a sexual misconduct scandal, which was seen as dampening interest in the job, which has been open since an interim president took over the position in January


The Advocate reports that 23 candidates submitted applications to oversee a system that includes colleges, medical schools, a law school and research institutions across the state. The president also works as chancellor of Louisiana's flagship university in Baton Rouge.

The eight semifinalists will be interviewed Monday and Tuesday, with the search committee expected to pick finalists on April 30 to submit to the LSU Board of Supervisors.

Contenders to be interviewed include Commissioner of Administration Jay Dardenne, the governor's chief budget adviser who runs the day-to-day operations of state government, and University of Louisiana System President Jim Henderson, who heads the state's largest public university system with nine colleges and 90,000 students.

Also to be interviewed are:

- Laurence Alexander, professor and chancellor at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff.
- Maj. Gen. Ron Clark, Army chief of staff for the United States Indo-Pacific Command.
 - Kelvin Droegemeier, former



director of the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy under former President Donald Trump's administration.

• Rustin Moore, professor and dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine at Ohio State University.

• Mary Ann Rankin, professor and former senior vice president and provost at the University of Maryland, College Park.

• Retired Army Lt. Gen. Jeff

Talley, president & CEO of consulting firm The P3i Group, LLC.

The university system is searching for a new leader in the midst of a scandal after a scathing independent report released earlier this year detailed years of LSU's widespread mishandling of claims of sexual harassment, domestic

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Food and Drug Administration recommended the country "pause" use of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine after six cases of rare blood clots were found among the 6.8 million people vaccinated with the doses.

"While I understand that this news may be concerning, I remain committed to working alongside public health experts to make sure people can get the answers they need to make an informed decision," Edwards, a Democrat, said in a statement.

Louisiana's health department said the blood clots being investigated "appear to be extremely rare." But the agency said anyone who received the Johnson & Johnson vaccine and develops severe headaches, abdominal pain, leg pain or shortness of breath within three weeks of immunization should contact a health care provider.

Defense attorney Eric Nelson argued that Chauvin's use of force was unattractive but appropriate and said he was distracted by a crowd of hostile bystanders on the scene. He also argued that Floyd died due to fentanyl and methamphetamine use, his resistance of officers and his underlying heart problems, rather than due to Chauvin's actions.

The Minnesota Department of Corrections says Chauvin was booked into Minnesota Correctional Facility-Oak Park Heights just before 5 p.m., as part of an agreement with the Hennepin County Sheriff's Office.

According to a pool report, George Floyd'sbrother, Philonise Floyd, was praying in the courtroom before the verdict was read.

"I was just praying they would find him guilty," he said after the conviction. "As an African American, we usually never get justice."

Family members of George Floyd, along with attorney Ben Crump and Rev. Al Sharpton, held a press conference about an hour after the verdict was read. Sharpton first led a prayer with the family.

"Let's lean into this moment and let's make sure that this moment will be documented for our children as they continue on the journey to justice knowing that the blood of George Floyd will give them a trail to find a way to a better America," Crump said.

The verdict was read in Hennepin County court just after 4 p.m. Tuesday. In addition to the second-degree murder conviction, the jury found Chauvin guilty of third-degree murder and seconddegree manslaughter.

"George Floyd mattered. He was loved by his family and his friends," Attorney General Keith Ellison said at a press conference Tuesday afternoon. "But that isn't why he mattered. He mattered because he was a human being. And there is no way that we can turn away from that reality."

President Joe Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris spoke Tuesday evening on Chauvin's conviction.

Darnella Frazier, who recorded the video of Floyd's death that spread quickly online on May 25, 2020, wrote on Facebook that "justice has been serve

In a statement released Tuesday evening, Minneapolis Police Chief Medaria Arradondo - who fired Chauvin one day

after Floyd's death, and testified against him in his trial — thanked the jurors for "their immense responsibility and honorable civic duty." He also called for peace and calm.

"Now is the time to use our humanity to lift each other up and not tear our City down," Arradondo said.

It took the jury roughly 10 hours of deliberation to reach their verdict — about four hours Monday afternoon and evening, and another six hours Tuesday starting at 8 a.m.

Chauvin was convicted on the following charges:

• Second-degree unintentional murder means causing death without intent by committing a felony.

• Second-degree manslaughter is causing death by unreasonable risk.

• Third-degree murder means causing death by an "eminently dangerous" act, showing a "depraved mind."

Earlier Tuesday, Hennepin County court employees were notified to stop working at all downtown courthouse locations and to "exit downtown immedi-

Public safety officials said there would be no statewide curfew Tuesday night. Following Chauvin's conviction, crowds gathered at the Hennepin County Government Center, George Floyd Square at 38th and Chicago and in Brooklyn Center, where 20-yearold Daunte Wright was shot and killed by police in the middle of Chauvin's trial.

The maximum penalty on second-degree murder charges is up to 40 years in prison, and the third-degree murder charges carries a sentence of up to 25 years in prison. The maximum penalty on second-degree manslaughter is up to 10 years in prison.

Judge Peter Cahill said sentencing will take place in about eight weeks.

The jurors heard closing arguments in the trial of Derek Chauvin Monday. The two sides split most significantly on the cause of death. The prosecution argued that all the law requires is that the prosecution prove beyond a reasonable doubt is that Chauvin's knee restraint was a "substantial cause" of Floyd's

The defense stressed that Chauvin did what any reason-

able officer would have done and said it was wrong to look only at nine minutes and 29 seconds when Floyd was on the ground.

In a departure from how he has looked throughout the trial, Chauvin was maskless and looked directly at his attorney throughout the three-hour defense closing statement. For the rest of the testimony and the prosecution closing he was head down, masked and taking extensive notes.

While Nelson's summation was lengthy, it was also complex. And that may be why Blackwell came back with this statement in his rebuttal argument. He said this case is not that complicated and that, in the state's view, Chauvin caused Floyd's death.

The line he left the jury with was this: "You were told, for example, that Mr. Floyd died because his heart was too big. You heard that testimony. And now having seen all the evidence, having heard all the evidence, you know the truth. And the truth of the matter is that the reason George Floyd is dead is because Mr. Chauvin's heart was too small."

Since the trial began last month, the prosecution called 38 people. The defense called seven people to testify in court. Chauvin was not one of them; he invoked his constitutional right not to testify. It was a decision that came without the jury present.

Now that Chauvin has been convicted, next comes the determination about whether any aggravating factors existed.

The first possible aggravating factor is whether the victim was "treated with particular cruelty." The second is if a child was present. Witnesses at the scene and who testified included two teens who were 17 at the time, as well as a 9-year-old.

"If they find aggravating factors the judge could go all the way up to the statutory maximum, which for count one is up to 40 years, count two up to 25 years, and count three up to 10 years," attorney Joe Tamburino told reporters.

The other three officers involved are charged with aiding and abetting, and are expected to be tried jointly in August.

Earl Gray, the attorney representing ex-officer Thomas Lane, told reporters he had no comment on Chauvin's conviction.

U.S. House Prepares Historic Session on Reparations Legislation

The House Judiciary Committee on Wednesday, April 14, plans to hold the first-ever markup of H.R. 40, the Commission to Study and Develop Reparation Proposals for African Americans Act.

The 10 a.m. session on Capitol Hill will help advance legislation first introduced about three decades ago that establishes a commission to examine slavery and discrimination in the United States from 1619 to the present and recommend appropriate remedies.

"Why is this significant now to have a markup in this historic moment in our history? The bill was introduced a year after the Civil Liberties Act that provided reparations for our Japanese-Americans, and we as African Americans supported it," Congresswoman Sheila Jackson-Lee (D-Texas) said during a news conference with African American media members.

"The bill would allow the country to finally confront the stark social disparities occurring in the African American community today and provide solutions," Jackson-Lee, the bill's lead sponsor, stated.

The historic markup of H.R. 40 is intended to continue a national conversation about how to confront the brutal mistreatment of African Americans during chattel slavery, Jim Crow segregation, and the enduring structural racism that remains endemic to American society today added House Judiciary

Committee Chairman Jerrold Nadler (D-NY).

"Long after slavery was abolished, segregation and subjugation of African Americans was a defining part of this nation's policies that shaped its values and its institutions," Nadler remarked.

"Today, we still live with racial disparities in access to education, health care, housing, insurance, employment, and other social goods that are directly attributable to the damaging legacy of slavery and government-sponsored racial discrimination," Nadler remarked.

"The creation of a commission under H.R. 40 to study these issues is not intended to divide, but to continue the efforts commenced by states, localities and private institutions to reckon with

God doesn't forget anything. He couldn't be God if He could forget. He forgives our sins, not forgetting that they ever happened, but in spite of the fact that they

did happen. He then relates to us on the basis of forgiveness rather than our sinfulness.

How often have we told ourselves that we could forgive someone who wronged us, but we could

never forget the offense? We may even have tried to forget what happened, but our efforts failed. The fact that the deed comes to our minds is not necessarily a problem.







Apple plans to expand ads business - FT

(Reuters) - Apple Inc is planning to expand its advertising business by adding a second advertising slot in its App Store search page's "suggested" section, the Financial Times reported on Thursday.

The new advertising slot, which will be rolled out by the end of the month, will allow advertisers to promote their apps across the whole network, rather than in response to specific searches, according to the report. (https://on.ft. com/3sG7Ikn)

The report comes as Apple plans to send prompts to iPhone users to allow apps to use their data for personalized advertising, a move that has drawn backlash from tech rival Facebook Inc, which argues the changes will hurt the social media company's ad business.

"Since its introduction in 1989 by the late Chairman John Conyers, and now through its continued introduction, H.R. 40 has galvanized governmental acknowledgment of the crime of slavery and its continuing societal impact," Jackson Lee maintained.


